Symposium Speakers



Keynote Speaker

Nancy Lawson is the author of *The Humane Gardener: Nurturing a Backyard Habitat for Wildlife* and *Wildscape: Trilling Chipmunks, Beckoning Blooms, Salty Butterflies, and other Sensory Wonders of Nature.* A nature writer, habitat consultant, popular speaker, and founder of The Humane Gardener, LLC, she pioneers creative, wildlifefriendly landscaping methods. Her presentations at diverse venues, from national wildlife refuges to local wildflower preserves, have inspired even seasoned horticulturists and wildlife experts to look at their landscapes in a new way. Certified as a Chesapeake Bay Landscape Professional and master naturalist, Nancy

co-chairs Howard County Bee City in Maryland and helped launch a community science project, Monarch Rx, based on scientific discoveries made in her own garden. Nancy's books, garden, advocacy, and scientific endeavors have been featured in The New York Times, The Washington Post, O magazine, Entomology Today, and Ecological Entomology.



Tradd Cotter is a microbiologist, professional mycologist and organic gardener who has been tissue culturing, collecting native fungi in the Southeast and cultivating fungi both commercially and experimentally for more than 22 years. In 1996 he founded Mushroom Mountain, which he owns and operates with his wife, Olga. The company, his platform for exploring applications for mushrooms in various industries, currently maintains more than 200 species of fungi for food production, mycoremediation of environmental pollutants and natural alternatives to chemical

pesticides. He's particularly fond of coming up with low-tech and no-tech cultivation strategies so that anyone can grow mushrooms on just about anything, anywhere in the world.




Kim Shearer, of the Morton Arboretum, advances the Arboretum's mission to make the world a greener, healthier, and more beautiful place by introducing plant selections with broad adaptability, disease resistance, and pest resistance.

Kim's expertise with trees and shrubs is complemented by her knowledge of selective breeding for disease resistance and environmental stress tolerance (drought, heat, cold, and salt).

The Haerther New Plant Development Program focuses on the breeding, selection, and evaluation of woody

landscape plants for urban and suburban environments. Through collaborations with external partners and stakeholders, new cultivars are introduced to the commercial nursery industry. Many of these selections are promoted through the brand Chicagoland Gro.



If he's not gardening, **Tom Christopher** is probably in the WESU FM radio studio, working on his weekly program and podcast, "Growing Greener." The goal is to make your land-scape healthier, more beautiful, more sustainable, and more fun. Growing Greener currently broadcasts on 18 radio stations and downloads as a podcast to 10,000 listeners a month.

A graduate of the New York Botanical Garden School of Professional Horticulture, Tom is the author of 16 books about gardening, among which is the award-winning Garden Revolution, which he co-authored with pioneering ecological landscape designer Larry Weaner. Together, they share strategies for bringing the landscape into harmony with the

local ecosystem, banishing weeds, and promoting natives while encouraging the garden to plant itself. Tom also publishes a syndicated weekly gardening column that appears in newspapers throughout central New England and upstate New York.

Outside the garden, Tom's interests extend to stone wall building and making vintage hard cider every fall from heirloom apples with his wife Suzanne. A long-time resident of Middletown, CT, he gardens there, and on the weekends in the Berkshire Hills of western Massachusetts.

Bethel School Garden A New Potting Bench for the Students


CMGA members Jamie S. McDonald and Sandra Wilson have been working for ten years with the students of Bethel F. A. Berry School to promote the love of gardening.

This year CMGA provided a grant to help create a potting bench for first and second grade students. 40 students participated in the spring of 2023 and 100 students participated in the fall of 2023.

250 seed garlic were planted in the fall of 2023. The children will be back in the spring of 2024 to direct seed in the potting bench, plant sets and start seed boxes.

The goal this year is to start a seed bank of vegetable crops.








Hollis Garden A Gem in Lakeland


For all the snowbirds and vacationers going to Florida this winter, there is more to do than visit the amusement parks and beaches. Florida has a nice system of state parks. Even some cities have beautiful gardens worth touring. One of these cities is Lakeland.



Hollis Garden is a public, formal botanical garden in Lakeland, Florida, between Tampa and Orlando. Hollis Garden is a botanical display garden set in a neo-classical architectural environment complete with patterned flower beds, public art, and ornamental fountains. Hollis Garden is on a 1.2-acre site located within historic Lake Mirror Park.




It is divided into sixteen sections or "rooms" with plantings being rotated throughout the year. Here you will find over ten thousand flowers, ornamental shrubs, and native trees. And the best part: the admission is free.

The park opened December 8, 2000, fulfilling a vision of the center's original architect that dated all the way back to 1928. Hollis Garden is a popular place to take pictures for any occasion. You can spend an hour or the full day just relaxing there.



The original design by Charles Wellford Leavitt, a student of Frederik Law Olmsted, around Mirror Lake was supposed to include a garden. But when the stock market crashed in 1929, only the concrete promenade around Mirror Lake was completed.

Finally, in 1998, Mark Hollis, president of the Publix Grocery Store

chain, and his wife Lynn donated one million dollars for the construction of the gardens. The botanical garden was designed based on gardens they saw during a trip to New Zealand.

In Hollis Garden, you can find over 10,000 flowers, ornamental shrubs, native trees and several water displays – all of which tell the a story of Florida's history. Florida limestone is represented in the grotto, native plants in the gardens, and vegetables and herbs. There are many rare species, including a frankincense tree. The strange fruit collection includes the peanut butter fruit and the blackberry jam fruit. One garden room is the Trees of America that features cuttings from famous trees. There is a Susan B. Anthony sycamore tree from a cutting near her grave and a cutting from a weeping willow from Elvis Presley's Graceland estate.

"Our goal is to make sure that when people visit Hollis Garden, they see something new and their experience is different every time they visit," explained Kevin Polk, the supervisor of the gardens.




